

Distribution of the Body and Blood of our Lord



This Sunday in the Church Year:

"Most assuredly, I say to you, whatever you ask the Father in My name He will give you." (Jn 16:23-33) To pray in Jesus' name is to pray as one baptized. For it is in the water that He put His name upon you, claiming you as His own, making you sons of God in Him with access to the Father. By His incarnation and crucifixion our Lord Jesus broke through the barrier of sin which separated us from God, opening a portal to the Father. To pray in Jesus' name is to pray with faith in Him as the one Mediator between God and men, who gave Himself a ransom for all. (I Timothy 2:1-6) Like Moses in the wilderness, Jesus is our go-between and intercessor before the throne of heaven. He was lifted up for us on the cross that we might be saved and restored to fellowship with the Father. (Num 21:4-9) Looking into this perfect teaching of liberty (James 1:22-27) we pray with boldness and confidence as dear children of God.



About Our Liturgy: Rogation Days

Rogation days are those weekdays in Rogate week prior to Ascension Day. Relating to this Sunday's focus on prayer, it is customary on these days to fast, to pray the Litany, and to seek the Lord's protection and blessing for the local congregation and for fields and crops.

THIS WEEK'S BULLETIN ART: Today's cover art is an illumination of King David at Prayer from a book of hours published in Northern France, c.1400-1450. The colored woodcut of Moses and the Bronze Serpent comes from the Luther Bible of 1534. On the facing page is a woodcut from a 1534 Bible published by Johann Dietenberger. The ivory carving of the Lamb of God, above, is probably Rhenish and dates from the 11th century. It is part of the collection of the Museo Nazionale del Bargello in Florence. On the back page is an illuminated letter, again depicting King David at prayer, from a Missal produced in Utrecht, c1425-1450.
