

This Sunday in the Church Year:

"Let there be light.' And there was light" (Gen 1:1–2:3). The Father speaks, and it is so. His Word accomplishes what it says. He created all things out of nothing through His Son by the power of the Holy Spirit. The Father's creative Word became flesh in Jesus Christ, that He might restore fallen creation and save fallen man. To the nobleman whose son was deathly ill, Jesus says, "Go your way; your son lives" (John 4:46–54). And in the very hour Jesus spoke, the nobleman's son was made well. The Word of Christ still accomplishes what it says. In baptism, absolution, and the Lord's Supper, He declares His life—giving forgiveness to you, and it is so. This saving Word of God is the sword of the Spirit by which you are able to fight off all the onslaughts of the devil (Eph. 6:10–17). "Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand."



About Our Ceremonies: Standing and Sitting

Posture is a bodily form of communication and expression utilized in the Divine Service. The body takes a different position depending on the situation one encounters. For example, when a lady enters the room, it is customary for the men in the room to stand up as a show of respect. When a judge enters his court, the bailiff calls out "all rise!"; likewise when the President or a monarch enters the room, his or her citizens stand. When one is hearing a lecture at school, however, it is customary to sit and listen, a posture of passive attentiveness.

The posture one assumes says something about what is going on. So also in the Divine Service. Since ancient times standing has been the main posture of the service. Here, as elsewhere, the Church models its worship after that of the heavenly congregation, who, according to St. John, stand before the throne of God and of the Lamb. According to St. Irenaeus of Lyon (c. 180) the custom of standing for the Divine Service on Sundays is of Apostolic origin and is also "a symbol of the resurrection, through which we have been set free, by the grace of Christ, from sins, and from death, which has been put to death under Him." So universal was the practice of standing throughout the service, that seats or pews for the congregation are unknown in Christian churches until after the Reformation. Those who could not stand because of physical ailments either reclined on the floor, brought a stool, or leaned on a cane or against a wall. It was simply not considered proper to sit in the presence of the Lord to whom all honor and glory belongs.

Though it is now customary to sit during some parts of the Divine Service standing is still the primary posture of worship. Hence the congregation stands at the beginning of the service and remains standing until the readings. Again, out of reverence for the Gospel of our Lord, the congregation stands at the reading of the Gospel and remains in that position through the confession of the Creed. She also stands during the prayers and remains doing so until the Distribution of the Sacrament. She stands again at the end of the service to give thanks to God and to receive His benediction. It is also customary in our churches to stand for the doxology at the end of a hymn or psalm, in honor of the Holy Trinity.

Sitting, even during the sermon, did not become common place until some time after the Reformation. Before that time only the clergy, reflecting the pattern of heavenly worship, were provided with seats. In the earliest basilicas the clergy actually sat around the back of the altar in the apse of the Chancel with the bishop in the center. From here the bishop preached while sitting, a position that marked him as one honored by the assembly as the ambassador of Christ.

Nowadays it is customary for the congregation to sit during the readings (except for the reading of the Gospel), during longer hymns and psalms, during the sermon and during the distribution of the Communion. Sitting, while expressing the passive reception of the Word of God and providing some physical relief, should be done in such a way that one does not become inattentive or irreverent. Even sitting one is still in the presence of Christ.
